Fly of the Month

Soft Hackle Pheasant Tail

Hook: Tiemco 3769 (2x heavy wet fly hook)
size 10-18

Thread 140 Denier, 6/0 for #12 hook

Tail: Pheasant Tail Fibers

Rib: Fine Copper Wire

Abdomen: Pheasant Tail Fibers

Thorax: Peacock Herl

Hackle: Partridge or Hen Back Feathers



Soft Hackle Flies

Learning to give flies movement will make you a much better angler. Using patterns that have a lot of natural motion, such as soft-hackle wet flies, is one of the best ways to do this. Soft hackles are some of the easiest trout flies to tie, and when fished with extra movement, such as swung or stripped like streamers, they produce lifelike, pulsating motion that triggers fish into striking. Trout are like any other fish, and when presented with a fleeing prey, they rarely pass it up. Soft hackles have a very long history of catching fish. Before the dry fly came along, all fly fishing entailed fishing wet flies and soft hackle "spiders". Spiders originated in Scotland, Northern England, and Italy more than three centuries ago. Early anglers fished these patterns downstream with rods measuring more than 10 feet long. This style of fishing still works in practically every type of trout water, from stream riffles to still waters, but you do not have to use an ultra-long fly rod, nor do you have to fish exclusively downstream. Today, a "soft hackle" refers to almost any nymph tied with a collar of hackle such as hen or partridge. This month's Fly the Soft Hackle Pheasant Tail, takes one of the best fishing nymphs and adapts it to the soft hackle style. It can be successfully fished dead drift style, on the swing or by combining the two styles. ed.

Merced River Tackle Tips

The Merced River has Rainbow, Brown Trout, Smallmouth Bass and even Striped Bass within the lower reaches near Lake McClure. Caddis are prevalent on the Merced. Relevant to this month's outing, Blue Wing Olive and Baetis Mayfly and Golden Stones are evident this time of year. Large Stoneflies also emerge during April and May, so this could be a rare opportunity since most years the water conditions make it difficult, at best, to fish during the large Stone Fly hatches. Some of the best water on the Merced for trout is where the South Fork meets the main river and continuing upstream to about the Park Boundary. Foresta Bridge marks the lower boundary of the Wild Trout section of the river (continued page 4)

Kirman Lake is a small back-country lake off of Highway 108 to the North of Bridgeport. It's about a 3 mile hike or mountain bike ride down a dirt road to the lake. Kirman has special regulations which are: artificial flies or lures only, barbless hooks, 2 fish limit with a 16" minimum. The most productive way to fish Kirman is generally from a float tube or kayak as most of the lake is surrounded by tules or cattails, without a watercraft of some kind it can be tough to get beyond the cattails to fish. Kirman is on our tentative outing list for the middle of next month. It's a bit a hike in and it's at altitude, so let's all give it some thought and see who's interested.

(*Merced continued*) which is open year-round. It's catch and release only for Rainbows and a limit of 5 Brown Trout, which are fairly rare, with single barbless hooks. Most years we'd be getting into the white water rafting season right now, which usually finishes up around the end of June. . Our best guess at flows for the outing are in the 350-500 cfs range and hoping for the lower end of this range. We should have a better idea at the Wednesday night meeting. The Merced can provide great dry fly fishing and the fish tend to be opportunistic and willing to take a variety of attractor patterns. Consolidated hatches that call on anglers to "match the hatch" are fairly rare. As for dry fly patterns, you might bring along: Elk Hair Caddis (12-16), Parachute and standard Adams (14-16), Stimulators (10-12), and Quiggle's Cripple (12-16), By the way, cripples and emergers can be dynamite on the Merced. Chances are that you'll catch more fish on nymphs and the standards like the: P.T., Bird's Nest, Prince Nymph and maybe a large black Stonefly, just in case should fit the bill. Oh, also our fly of the month, the Soft Hackle Pheasant Tail could be a super fly for this outing.

If you haven't fished the Merced, be advised that it can be a bit challenging to wade, mostly because of the prevalence of its slippery basketball sized boulders, Studs and staffs are advised. It usually fishes as pocket water and getting a good drag-free drift can be the task. Most of the time short casts with a 7 1/2 foot 5x leader will serve you well. Do your best to keep most of your line off the water in the small pockets. Fish seem to love to sit at the tail outs of the small pools and swipe at your fly just as it goes over the falls into the next pool. While I almost always use a 9 foot, 3 weight rod, a 4 or 5 weight will probably be more to the liking of most anglers, especially if the wind comes up or if the water is high. As for where the hot fishing spots are, ask any of the members who fish it regularly and you'll get a different answer from everyone of them. For me personally, I like fishing above the Foresta Bridge My three favorite spots to hit are: the Sewer Hole, If you park on the northwest side of the river across the street from sewer treatment plant, you can't miss it. Next is Abbie Loop. You enter Abbie Road from the southeast side of the river about 2 mile upstream from Foresta bridge. There's a nice place to park under the tree. You can fish up stream all the way to where the river goes under the highway then walk back down to your car, but it will take you half a day to fish this whole stretch. Last on the list is the Satellite Dish Run. Continuing upstream to just before you get to El Portal, if you keep your eyes peeled you'll see some cable company's satellite dishes on you right. A hundred yards or so down stream you'll find some good parking. There some nice deep runs and pockets in here that can provide some very nice fishing.

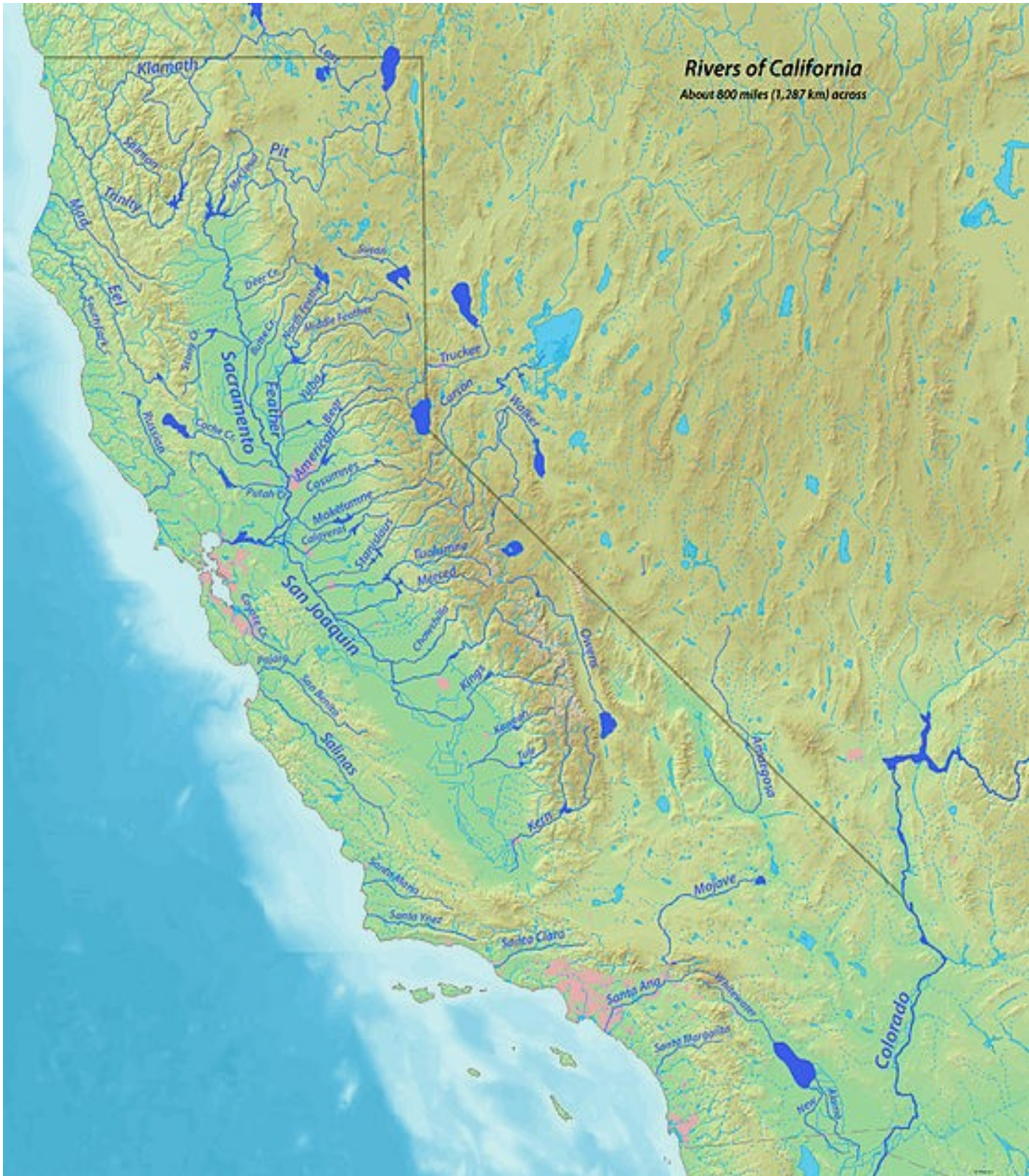
